CRAIGVILLE CONSIDERED

On County Road 700 East (IN 301), between Indiana 124 to the south and US 224 on the north, lies the Greater Metropolitan Area of Craigville. (Notable suburbs of this town under consideration are Bluffton, Ossian, Decatur and Monroe.) Craigville, like many small towns in Wells County, have already peaked in population and commerce in their past. Entering the town in the late 1950s and early 1960s from the south, one would pass the elevator and feed mill on the west before crossing the railroad track. Then on the left side was a store and Harv Ginter's barber shop. More stores and houses, and then the Craigville garage were passed before reaching the large brick school house. A few more houses and then one was out of town heading for 300 North. On the east side of the main street was stores, the bank and telephone company along with several houses. The editor better remembers the west side for some reason; maybe because the earliest haircuts remembered was in the barber shop and occasional visits to the Craigville Garage, which sold mowers and appliances. For a better memory of the other side of the street, we turn to Dorothy Hunt.

Mrs. Matilda Steely (*sic*) was born Feb. 1856 and died at her residence one and one hald mile south of here, Feb. 12th, 1891. She has been suffering with that dreaded disease, consumption, for over a year. She leaves a husband and son and a number of friends to mourn their loss.

The death messenger visited the home of Mr. Pules and called the aged father, Huddle, away. He has been suffering with a tumor on his face for the past few months, but God has now taken him home where there will be no more suffering or pain. He was born in Farfield (*sic*) county, Ohio, July 16th, 1822 and died Feb. 11th, 1891. aged 68 years, 6 months and 25 days. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev, Johnson. He leaves a number of friends to mourn the loss.

Plant in Operation at Craigville That Turns Out Nickels, Quarters and Half Dollars.

Craigville is the seat of operations for a small counterfeit plant where bogus nickels, quarters and fifty cent pieces are manufactured with little effort at concealment on the part of the maker of the spurious coins. The bad money has been found circulating freely there at different times and almost every resident of the place has seen or handled some of the stuff and moreover it is an open secret with almost every one who is operating the plant that turns out the money. The wonder is that a United States marshal has not paid a visit to the town before this.

A Craigville gentleman today said that the molds that made the bad nickels, quarters and halves had been seen by several parties and that they are owned by a young man of the village who is a genius in more ways than one. Few quarters or halves have been made but many of the nickels are in circulation. One night this week boys threw half a dozen of the bad looking nickels in the fire and all of them melted in a few minutes. They were made of lead and babbitting metal.

It is said that the young man passes little or none of the money himself. He has been detected looking in at store windows, however, when he had other boys on the inside "pushing the queer". It is supposed that the reason the quarters or halves are not circulated is because he cannot successfully counterfeit them with the metals he has at hand. Craigville residents have never reported the culprit but they

are on their guard against accepting any more of his bad money.

Fred Furhman will be Put Out of Business by the Commissioners.

Todd & Gordon Friday filed a remonstrance bearing something like three hundred names with the auditor. Their remonstrance had for its object the prevention of Fred Fuhrman from getting a liquor license. Fuhrman has had a saloon at Craigville for several years, but recently there have been many complaints in regard to the way he did business. Accordingly a remonstrance was prepared and put in circulation against him. Fuhrman has made an application for a license and was to have been before the board of commissioners Monday at their regular session.

According to the vote cast at the last election two hundred and sixty-four names were necessary to defeat his application and make the remonstrance hold good according to the law. The remonstrators went to work to get this number and they have been having quite a fight to do so. He had the only saloon in Lancaster township and there were two factions at work. One side wanted the saloon put out of business while the other side were as anxious to see it remain. They had as much fun out of the fight for names as a county primary and about as much electioneering was done.

The remonstrance as filed Friday is sufficient to put him out of business with a good margin to go on. Had Furhman filed withdrawals Thursday he might have had some chance of winning but it seems that he has given up the fight. All the papers he could file Friday would be of no use, as, according to the law, they had to be filed Thursday. This is where the

remonstrators get a day the best of it. Their papers hold good if filed Friday and they have a chance of seeing what the other side has done and making a last effort to get even.

FRED FURHMAN KNOCKED OUT

The Remonstrators at Craigville Have the Upper Hand of the Saloon.

Fred Fuhrman, the Craigville saloon man, is knocked out of a chance to get a liquor license for at least two years to come. At the last term of the commissioner's court, Fred had advertised that he would make application for a liquor license to sell booze at Craigville. The people of that vicinity got busy and circulated a petition which they were ready to present to the commissioners

asking that the license be not granted. Furhman made a big effort to get a counter petition in effect but failed to have the proper number of signatures. He then decided that he would not apply for a license and this gave him another chance.

Had he made the application and been defeated, he would have been forbidden, according to the law, to apply for a period of two years. He waited until that therm was over and advertised to make application at the May term. Again the remonstrators went out and secured a number of signatures sufficient to defeat him. Furhman also had men at work carrying a counter petition and for a time it looked as if he would be successful. Thursday was the last day he had, according to the law, to file his withdrawl of names and he failed to show up. The remonstrators filed their papers Friday and Fred is again put out of business. His saloon has been closed for the past month and will no doubt be closed at Craigville for the next two years.

Had he filed sufficient names to allow him a license, the remonstrators had a plan whereby they were to make one last ditch effort to defeat him. They had until Friday at midnight to file their paper and Friday twenty-five men were ready to begin a systematic canvass of the county to get a few more names. Frank Gordonm, attorney for the remonstrators, stated the he would ask the commissioners at their session Monday to make a record of the remonstrance filed. They have enough names and Furhman has advertised his intention of applying. They do not to want carry the petition every month and feel that under the law they have accomplished their ends and want the trouble stopped.

BURGLARS BLEW A SAFE AT CRAIGVILLE.

Also Ransacked Clover Leaf Depot but Never got a Cent Used a Little Nitro and Some Tools.

Burglars entered the Frank Hower general store at Craigville last night about midnight and shattered the safe with a charge of dynamite but got nothing for their labor. After ransacking the Clover Leaf depot they left the town.

The Hower store is located on the principal street of the city. The burglars got in evidently with skeleton keys as this morning both front and back doors were found open but not injured. The work was done on the safe with a sledge hammer cold chisel and high explosive either dynamite or nitro-glycerine was used as the safe was badly wrecked. There was no cash in the safe and the only thing negotiable that could be found was a check for \$100 but his and a lot of notes and some accounts were not taken. The town was not disturbed by the explosions but Alfred Abbott heard the shots fired but did not get up to investigate.

From the Hower store the burglars went to the Clover Leaf depot which they ransacked but evidently found nothing to suit them as nothing was missing Thursday. They took all the lamps from the Hower store to make the search at the depot. Nothing in the store was disturbed except the safe and lamps.

Most of the Craigville residents believe home talent did the work bu[t] there is no definite clew as to who did it and how many were engaged. No horses or vehicles of any kind were missing this morning and it is believed that if foreign talent was engaged in the job they would have stolen some means of getting away.

There was a bad gang of desperate looking characters loafing around Bluffton Wednesday. They said they were boiler makers by trade and were traveling to find work. They did not look the part of honest laboring men and it may be possible that some of them did the work at Craigville.

CHURCH AT CRAIGVILLE STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Children's Day Exercises were Being Held and Many were Shocked, two Men Getting Part of Current.

Scores of people were given a severe shock during the storm Sunday evening when a bolt of lightning struck the Christian Union church at Craigville, at which Children's Day exercises were in progress at the time. The church was crowded and when the bolt of lightning struck it seemed to divide its forces between a telephone pole just across the street and the chimney of the church. The pole was shattered while the bolt which struck the church followed the chimney and down the stove pipe to the auditorium below. Many in the congregation were shocked, but John Pierce, father of Deputy Sheriff Charles Pierce, and Clell Pyle received the most severe shock and had close calls from death. Both received a glancing portion of the bolt, and Pierce had one side of his face and one arm burned, while Pyle had one knee and his foot burned. Both were so stunned they were temporarily paralyzed, and both feel the effect today. A horse belonging to Will Garton stood near the church and it was knocked down. A panic ensued and most of the congregation left. The church received little damage.

VILLA NORTH ON CRAIGVILLE LINE

INCREASE IN PRICE CAUSES BLUFFTON PHONES THERE TO BE TAKEN OUT.

The residents of Villa North are to be subscribers on the Craigville telephone line and at the present time all but one of the homes are without the Bluffton phones for the first time since the pretty suburb was established. The work of connecting the Craigville lines, which will give the people free connections with Tocsin, Honduras, Vera Cruz, Markle and Uniondale will probably be started within the next few days, according to an announcement made today. The line now runs within a mile of Villa North.

The installing of the Craigville phones follows a ruling of the United Telephone company raising the price of phones in Villa North from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per month. The increase in price was made a year ago and all the phones except those of the homes of A. H. Reed, Joseph Anderson and A. R. Huyette were removed. Messrs. Reed and Anderson held over until March of this year but their old contract and their phones have now been taken out. Mr. Huyette will retain his phone on the Bluffton line.

The Craigville or German Telephone company, will contract to install the phones for \$1.00 per month, it is said, and eleven Villa North homes will have them in a short time. The new ruling of the

United company effects all people living a quarter of a mile or more outside of the city limits. As subscribers on the Craigville line it will be necessary for the Villa North people to pay ten cents toll to call into Bluffton.

TALK OF TWO TELEPHONE COM-PANIES REVIVED BY EXTEN-SION OF LINES.

Will the German Telephone company think of breaking into the telephone business in Bluffton following the installation of their phones in the Villa North suburb? This is the question that arises following the announcement of the Villa North citizens yesterday that they would be subscribers of the Craigville company.

A few years ago directors of the German or Craigville Telephone company talked of breaking into the Bluffton field and asking a franchise to do business in the city. The argument did not carry with the entire board of directors and the talk was soon abandoned. The company has gradually been extending lines toward Bluffton and it will only be necessary to string a line about a mile to connect the Villa North homes. The people of the suburb having their Bluffton phones taken out because of the increase in rates may cause the talk of the German company's extension to be revived. The Craigville company is to connect the homes for \$1 a month and as previously announced this will give the subscribers free toll connections with practically all towns in the county north of

Bluffton. To telephone into Bluffton it will cost the people ten cents.

At the time some of the directors of the Craigville company talked of asking for a franchise from the Bluffton city council there was a plan to make the rates \$1 per month for residential phones and \$1.50 per month for business phones.

The outcome will be watched with considerabl[e] interest as at various times there has been talk of two telephone companies in Bluffton. The Craigville line is to be connected with the Villa North homes within the next few days, it is said.

DEAF MUTE RUNS MANY BUSINESSES

I. D. BRIGHT SUCCEEDS AT CRAIGVILLE IN SPITE OF HANDICAP.

If you have no desire to "talk" with your hands don't move to Craigville. This little town probably has more people who can use their fingers for conversation than any town of the size in Indiana. It all comes about as the result of Isriael D. Bright, one

of the most prominent business men there being unable to talk or hear. Since he has lived in Craigville no one has ever heard him utter a sound, but this has not prevented him succeeding in business.

At the present time Mr. Bright conducts a barber shop, shoe repair shop, and is also engaged in the manufacture of harness. It is the quietest barber shop in the county, without a doubt, and even the weather is not discussed in the way that an outsider would be able understand the conversation. In spite of his misfortune, Mr. Bright is understood by the people of the little town and he also understands them. Most of them have become experts in conversing with their fingers and they get along just as well without talking. In a room owned by Mr. Bright in the rear of where he is engaged in business, an automobile garage is conducted by his cousin, The sound of the chugging motors fails to annoy him and he never grows tired of the pounding of the hammers in his shoe and harness shop.

One of Mr. Bright's neat ways of advertising is a business card on one side of which is his picture, and on the reverse the finger alphabet. These cards he hands out to his patrons and if the people do not learn his way of talking, it is their own fault.

Mr. Bright was left a mute after an illness with measles when a small boy. At that time he lived near Honduras, in Adams county, but for many years he has lived in Craigville and is raking in the sheckels from his many customers. He has no oppositioin in his many lines of trade, but this fact does no make him independent and he is always sociaible (*sic*) and glad to have new customers.

CRAIGVILLE ELEVATOR DESTROYED BY FIRE.

The little town of Craigville, six miles east of Bluffton, suffered one of the worst fires in its history Sunday morning, when the elevator at that place, owned by G. T. Burke, of Decatur, was completely destroyed by flames.

The loss is estimated at \$10,000 to \$12,000, with insurance partially covering that amount.

The fire, of unknown origin, was discovered about 3 o'clock Sunday morning, by George Humrickhouse and Charles Wolfe, both of whom live near the scene of the fire. They quickly gave the alarm that roused all residents of the little town, but the flames had such headway that there was not the least possibility of getting the fire under control. The building is reported to have been fully one-half in flames before the fire was first discovered. The fire was prevented from communicating to other buildings, and that was the extent to the aid volunteer firemen could afford. The elevator stood about 300 feet from the depot, on the northside of the Clover Leaf tracks, and there was no other building closer than about 100 feet.

3,000 Bushels of Grain Burned.

Contents of the elevator, in addition to the machinery destroyed, included about 3,000 bushels of grain, consisting of 400 to 500 bushels of wheat, 1,300 bushels of corn, 1,500 bushels of oats, and 500 to 600 bushels of rye.

The Clover Leaf railroad company also suffered a loss in the destruction of a box car loaded with 1,200 bushels of shelled corn. This had been billed out Friday and was in the company's hands and it will have to stand the loss.

The origin of the fire is unknown and probably the mystery never will be solved.

One theory is that it started in the engine room.

The elevator was a frame structure built several years ago by E. L. Carroll, of Decatur, and the roof and siding were of galvanized iron.

Gideon Gerber was in charge as manager of the elevator for Mr. Burke. He stated Sunday that Mr. Burke, after a visit to Craigville, stated that the elevator will be rebuilt as quickly as possible, and that in the meantime they will continue in business at Craigville buying and shipping grains, hay, etc. A warehouse which the flames did not reach will be used as a place of business until a new elevator can be erected.

Mr. Burke owned the only elevator located at Craigville. He operates elevators at several other points.
